ROCK ART

Man's first awareness of the world around came through his primeval sense of sight and ability to hear. These two senses have stimulated artistic expression - visual and aural, in the pre-historic past as also contemporary cultures. The twin programmes of Ādi Dṛṣya (primeval sight) and Ādi Śravya (primeval sound) have been initiated by the IGNCA to trace the long continuities in the Indian Arts. Rock Art forms the crucial programme of the Ādi Dṛṣya programme. Rock Art consists of paintings, engravings, cupmarks, etc., directly on rock surface. It is almost universal and rock art sites have been reported in Asia, Africa, Australia, Europe and the U.S.A. The largest concentration of rock art sites in India are in M.P., South-eastern U.P., and J & K and the other areas are Assam, Bihar, Gujṛat, Karnataka, Maharashtra, Orissa, Rajasthan etc.
